everything originates Pythagoras c 570 495 BC Known for his contributions to mathematics and astronomy Pythagoras saw numbers as the ultimate reality and argued for the harmony of the universe Heraclitus c 535 475 BC Famous for his adage Everything flows Heraclitus emphasized the constant flux and change inherent in reality He believed in the unity of opposites arguing that fire was the fundamental principle Democritus c 460 370 BC Known for his atomic theory Democritus posited that all matter is composed of indivisible particles called atoms The Classical Period c 5th 4th Century BC The Golden Age of Philosophy This era saw the rise of Socrates Plato and Aristotle whose philosophical contributions continue to shape our understanding of ethics politics and metaphysics Socrates c 470 399 BC Socrates is known for his method of inquiry the Socratic method which involved asking probing questions to stimulate critical thinking and selfexamination He famously believed that the unexamined life is not worth living Plato c 428 348 BC Socrates student Plato developed his teachers ideas into a comprehensive philosophical system He is best known for his theory of Forms which posits that the world we perceive is merely a shadow of a more perfect eternal realm of Forms He also wrote extensively on politics arguing for a philosopherking to govern a just society Aristotle c 384 322 BC Platos student Aristotle disagreed with his teacher on several key points He emphasized observation and empirical evidence laying the groundwork for scientific methodology He wrote on a vast array of subjects including logic ethics politics metaphysics and biology The Hellenistic Period c 3rd Century BC 1st Century AD New Approaches to Life As the Greek citystates declined a new era emerged characterized by a focus on individual happiness and the pursuit of a good life This period saw the emergence of schools of thought like Stoicism Epicureanism and Skepticism Stoicism Founded by Zeno of Citium Stoicism emphasized virtue and selfcontrol as the means to achieve happiness Stoics believed that we should accept our fate with equanimity and focus on what is within our control 3 Epicureanism Founded by Epicurus Epicureanism aimed to achieve happiness through pleasure but not necessarily sensual gratification They argued that true pleasure comes from the absence of pain and the pursuit of a simple life free from unnecessary desires Skepticism Skeptics like Pyrrho of Elis questioned the possibility of attaining certain knowledge They argued that we should suspend judgment on matters that cannot be known with absolute certainty Ethical Considerations Ancient Greek philosophy offers a rich tapestry of ethical frameworks that continue to resonate today Virtue Ethics Plato and Aristotle emphasized the importance of developing virtuous character They believed that the pursuit of virtues like courage justice wisdom and temperance leads to a flourishing life Deontology While not explicitly articulated by Greek philosophers the concept of duty and moral obligation can be seen in the

a full account of the philosophy of the greek and roman worlds from the last days of aristotle c 320 bc until 100 bc hellenistic philosophy for long relatively neglected and unappreciated has over the last decade been the object of a considerable amount of scholarly attention now available in paperback this 1999 volume is a general reference work which pulls the subject together and presents an overview the history is organised by subject rather than chronologically or by philosophical school with sections on logic epistemology physics and metaphysics ethics and politics it has been written by specialists but is intended to be a source of reference for any student of ancient philosophy for students of classical antiquity and for students of the philosophy of later periods greek and latin are used sparingly and always translated in the main text

reale's volume supplies a synthesis previously lacking a synthesis in the historical treatment of the great philosophies of the hellenistic age the academy the peripatos the stoa the garden of epicurus scepticism and eclecticism reale's extensive and fully documented treatment of the major schools of the period is unified by his thesis that the ethics developed by these major schools were secular faiths that sprang from intuitions about the meaning of life first emotionally grasped and then systematically and rationally developed it is for this reason that the teachings of these schools endured almost continuously for about 500 years it is for the same reason that the founders of the schools were considered gods and were actually in a certain sense the saints of secular faiths and religions in this book reale traces the decline of the philosophical schools of the classical period the post platonist academy the post aristotelian peripatos and the minor socratic schools the destruction of the polis and the incapacity of the schools to address the concerns of the new age were the fertile grounds from which the new schools developed the garden of epicurus the porch of zeno and the

sceptical movement initiated by pyrrho form the core of the volume the volume contains a select bibliography and an index of names and greek terms as well as an index of citations

greek philosophers of the hellenistic age examines an important but frequently neglected group of philosophers writing after aristotle between the third and first centuries b c the work of a distinguished intellectual historian this book is based on an erudite reading of a vast number of primary sources the greek and latin writings of the philosophers and the fragments paraphrases and testimonies from their lost works kristeller explores the thought of epicurus zenon and cleanthes the founder of the stoic school and his successor pyrrhon and arcesilaus the founder of skepticism and the philosopher who introduced it into the platonic academy and chrysippus the third head of the stoic school and its most important representative other figures include carneades and philo of larissa the second and third representatives of skepticism in the platonic academy respectively panaetius the first leader of middle stoicism and antiochus of ascalon the head of the academy who led it back from skepticism and prepared middle platonism which paved the way for neoplatonism originally presented as a series of lectures before the scuola normale superiore in pisa italy greek philosophers of the hellenistic age assesses a group of philosophers who exerted an enormous influence upon pagan and christian writers of late antiquity including cicero and st augustine and on many medieval and early modern philosophers theologians and other thinkers

the purpose of this book is to trace the main developments in greek philosophy during the period which runs from the death of alexander the great in 323 b c to the end of the roman republic 31 b c these three centuries known to us as the hellenistic age witnessed a vast expansion of greek civilization eastwards following alexander s conquests and later greek civilization penetrated deeply into the western mediterranean world assisted by the political conquerors of greece the romans but philosophy throughout this time remained a predominantly greek activity the most influential thinkers in the hellenistic world were stoics epicureans and sceptics this book gives a concise critical analysis of their ideas and their methods of thought the last book in english to cover this ground was written sixty years ago in the interval the subject has moved on quite rapidly since the last war but most of the best work is highly specialized there is a clear need for a general appraisal of hellenistic philosophy which can provide those who are not specialists with an up to date account of the subject hellenistic philosophy is often regarded as a dull product of second rate thinkers who are unable to stand comparison with plato and aristotle this book will help to remove such misconceptions and arouse wider interest in a field which is fascinating both historically and conceptually

philosophers and doctors from the period immediately after aristotle down to the second century ce were particularly focussed on the close relationships of soul and body such relationships are particularly intimate when the soul is understood to be a material entity as it was by epicureans and stoics but even aristotelians and platonists shared the conviction that body and soul interact in ways that affect the well being of the living human being these philosophers were interested in the nature of the soul its structure and its powers they were also interested in the place of the soul within a general account of the world this leads to important questions about the proper methods by which we should investigate the nature of the soul and the appropriate relationships among natural philosophy medicine and psychology this volume part of the symposium hellenisticum series features ten scholars addressing different aspects of this topic
